Will Fish Tackle Report by Craig Newton



7/13/2023

We are experiencing the second heat wave of the Summer and the lakes and rivers are finally entering summer patterns. Rivers are running at normal flows and reservoirs and lakes are full. Lake surface temperatures are rising and fish are going deeper. Many of the upper elevation lakes are now open with good access. Some of the campgrounds are still in clean up mode so call before you go.

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BULLARDS BAR: Kokanee fishing continues to be very productive at Bullards Bar. There are fish from 30' down to 50' that are taking dodger/hoochie, dodger/cut plug, and dodger/spinner combos. Average size is 12" with a few coming in over 13". There are schools of fish deeper that tend to be bigger if you can get them to bite.

FOLSOM LAKE: Cold water species are being finicky this summer as anglers struggle to land any. Near limits up to 4 pounds have been reported in the last week. Fish are half way up the north fork. Trout are even more rare than the kings right now. Bass are hitting most presentations from the bank down to 20'.

Make sure to get there early and mid week to avoid the recreational boat traffic.

FRENCH MEADOWS/HELL HOLE: Access to both of these lakes is through Georgetown via Wentworth Springs and 11 Pines Rd. Take your time and keep pushing that pedal on the right and you'll get there. The last 7 miles to Hell Hole or French Meadows from the French Meadows Road junction require patience as the potholes can come up on you quickly. French Meadows has been producing beautiful rainbows and browns for anglers trolling Rapalas and Dodger/Worm combos. Hell Hole provided a limit of Kokanee from 14.5-15.5" in less than 2 hours. Kokanee were found in 80-120' of water with the downrigger at 40-50'. Pink, orange and silver apex did the job. Mackinaw and big browns are on tap at Hell Hole as well. Camping is available at the Big Meadows campground for Hell Hole anglers.

OROVILLE LAKE: Bass is the word at Oroville. Kings have not shown up for those who have tried. Not sure if the kings are going to make an appearance this year.

SIERRA LAKES: Mid elevation lakes like <u>Scotts Flat</u>, <u>Sugar Pine</u>, <u>Stumpy Meadows</u>, and <u>Sly Park</u> are fishing well when not over taken by recreational boaters. <u>Spaulding</u> opened 6/30/23 and <u>Jackson Meadows</u> is open now. <u>Loon Lake</u> opened the last week in June and has been fishing well for Rainbows and Browns. <u>Union Valley</u> has been producing Mackinaw and Rainbows, jury is still out on the Kokanee this year.





STAMPEDE RESERVOIR: Kokanee fishing had been very good over the past several weeks but has slowed down recently. There has been significant pressure on the kokanee and that may have something to do with the slow down. Try changing things up when the kokanee bite slows down. Spinners in different colors are turning the bite back on to finish the last few fish of your limits. Some trout are starting to be caught as well.

DELTA: Striper fishing has been ok for trollers as the bass move down the system after the spring spawn. Deep divers in 12 to 16' of water and Rat-L-Traps in the shallows are doing the trick. Crawdad colors along rocky banks are a key striper target this time of year.

Stampede Kokanne Fishing Tournament Report

The Rooster Tails Fishing Club Stampede fishing tournament was held on Wednesday, June 14 th . Wednesday morning a thick layer of fog covered the lake, however the lake was calm. Fish were being caught in most areas of the lake including around the islands, near the dam and at the confluence on the west side, which produced the larger fish.

Hot lures were GVF gold digger spinner in orange, Arctic Fox Flies in pink and orange and pink hoochies with a small spinner in front. all tipped with corn and trolled behind a small dodger. Most fish were between 35-50' deep.

Twenty five members signed up for the tournament with 13 members weighing in. Bruce Hanson and Shawn Conlan started the weigh in just before 1pm and stopped at 2pm.

Tournament winners were as follows:

First Place - Russ Smith and Mike Steer tied with 4 lbs 8 oz each - \$200 each

Rooster Tails Fish Club Local Lake Information Lake Clementine

Lake Clementine is part of the Auburn State Recreation Area. The lake is three and a half miles long and lies along the North Fork of the American River. Lower lake Clementine has a boat ramp and 25 parking spaces. The lake has Small and Large Mouth Bass, Bluegill and Rainbow Trout. I have had better luck for Rainbows at the East end of the lake just before the camping beaches in the early part of the year, before July. I think the Rainbows wash down the river and hang out in the lake for a while. The water is shallow on the east end of the lake and a trolling motor is needed to avoid the rocky bottom.



This lake is just a few miles from Auburn. The road leading to the Dam and the launch ramp is a long narrow paved road with one sharp turn near the dam that is too sharp for long rigs. Also, dogs are not allowed on the lake or at the boat in camping area. The maximum allowed vehicle length is 50'. A State Park fee is required to launch and park unless you have an annual State Park pass. Lake Clementine is a Beautiful little lake for a quick fishing or sight seeing trip.

Upper Lake Clementine

Upper Lake Clementine is for Day Use only, motorized vessels are not permitted. Operating hours are 8:00am to 6:30pm. The parking lot is limited to 170 vehicles, parking is on a first come first serve basis, a \$10.00 parking fee per vehicle applies. Dogs, glass containers, and alcohol are not permitted. Seasonal barbeque restrictions may apply.

Seasonal Access Calendar:

April 15 to September 30: Open seven days a week.

October 1 to October 14: Open weekends only.

October 15 to April 14: Closed for Winter season.

Directions: From Interstate-80 take the Foresthill exit. Continue on Foresthill Road 5.5 miles, turn left onto Upper Lake Clementine Road, take the dirt access road 2 miles down the canyon, high clearance vehicles are recommended.

Lower Lake Clementine

As of May 1st, 2022 Wake Surfing is prohibited at Lake Clementine. This new regulation was enacted due to damage to the shoreline, other vessels and the marina facility caused by abnormally large wakes associated with wake surfing.

Lake Clementine was created when the North Fork Dam was completed in 1939 by the Army Corps of Engineers as a debris dam. The dam rises 155 feet above the foundation and has a crest elevation of 718 feet. The reservoir has a capacity of 14,700 acre-feet, and a surface area of 280 acres. The reservoir is approximately 3.5 miles long and has very narrow steep canyon walls.

This small lake features a boat launch ramp, marina and boat-in campsites. Day users are welcome, but the Day Use Beach is only accessible by boat, kayak or canoe. Lower Lake Clementine has limited boat trailer

parking, there are 25 trailer parking spots available on a first come first serve basis. The maximum length of vehicle and trailer is 50 feet. Lake Clementine's boat ramp and day use parking is open year round, weather permitting.

Directions: Lake Clementine is located off the Auburn-Foresthill Road, approximately two miles from Auburn. From I-80 in Auburn, exit at Foresthill, drive 2.5 miles on Foresthill Road, turn left onto Lake Clementine Road, and then follow Lake Clementine Road 2 miles down to the entrance station. Lake Clementine Road is narrow, and you may encounter vehicles towing boats on trailers, and bicyclists on the road. Please use caution and observe the 15 mph speed limit

2023 Jackpot Contest Is Open

No fish-entry will be accepted without a two-week prior entry fee payment. The official contest competition is from January 1 through November 30 of each calendar year. After the January breakfast meeting, only fish caught within the official contest term qualify for the contest.

Contest cash prizes and recognition certificates will be awarded at the Rooster Tails Fishing Club's Annual Jackpot Contest Awards Ceremony. Jackpot entrants that do not have a winning Jackpot Contest fish entry will have a chance to win a proportionate cash prize based on a random drawing 'for-one-that-got-away' at the ceremony. Potential random contest winners must be present at the event to receive their prize.
